REV. DAVID ERNEST FERGUSON

(August 21, 1928 - April 7, 2017)

(first rector of St. Stephen's Anglican Church)

FERGUSON, Rev. David Ernest, born August 21st, 1928, Toronto, Ontario, son of the late John and May Ferguson, died peacefully at Dartmouth General Hospital surrounded by family on April 7, 2017. David received his education in Toronto at Malvern Collegiate. He loved classical music and was a highly trained trumpeter in military bands. He worked for many years in the insurance business in Toronto and Vancouver. He graduated from Huron College, London and was ordained in the Anglican church, 1961. His first parish was in Saskatoon, Sask. where he served for six years before moving to Nova Scotia. He served in the parishes of Maitland and Shelburne prior to moving to Dartmouth. He was Assistant Rector at Christ Church for 20 years. Later he was Rector of Holy Trinity and St. Andrew's Locks Rd. The main focus of his ministry was community outreach and demonstrating God's love by helping the poor and disadvantaged. David held leadership roles in various community groups including, member of the initial committee for Habitat for Humanity, Chairman of the Shelburne County Children's Aid Society, City of Dartmouth Crisis Housing Committee, Freedom Foundation (people recovering from addictions), Board member of Homebridge Youth Society; Chairman of the Board and member of Dartmouth Work Activity (helping young adults with education and training); David served on the North American Board of the International Order of St. Luke's, Food Bank and Clothing ministry of Christ Church.


He was predeceased by his first wife Sheila (Robinson) Ferguson and son Neil. He is survived by Catherine Ferguson, Dartmouth; Brenda (David) Jacobsen, Norwalk CT; Craig (Mary) Ferguson, Lunenburg NS; Linda Ferguson, Rochester, NY; six grandchildren, Ingrid (NYC), Rosemary (AZ), Rachael (Kingston, ON); Henry, David (Rochester); and Tessa (Lunenburg). He leaves behind his brother, Rev. Canon Alan (Marilyn) Ferguson, Scarborough, Ontario and sister Jean (Bob) McGinley, Barrie, Ontario and several nieces and nephews.

He is survived by his beloved wife, Sheila (Laverty) Ferguson, and three step-daughters, Sandra (Bruce) Whitmore; Ellen (Larry) Hatt; Susan (Stan) MacEachern, and four step-grandchildren, Allison and Laura, Craig and Kevin.

David loved spending time with family and enjoyed camping, travelling, gardening, NS symphony concerts, Neptune theater and playing bridge. Together with Sheila they participated in the Dartmouth Meals on Wheels and serving at Margaret's House soup kitchen. In lieu of flowers, memorial donations may be made to Metro Food Bank and Phoenix Centre for Youth, Halifax or a charity of your choice. Many thanks to the caring staff of the Dialysis Unit of DGH. Funeral service was Saturday, April 15th, 2017 at Christ Church with a reception to follow in the parish hall.

BLESSED ARE YOU WHO HEAR THE LORD!

THE BEATITUDES (Matthew 5:1-12)

The Hebrew words make it clear that these statements are to be heard as a congratulation for what already is – for the state into which the believer already has entered. The Greek word for *blessed* implies a godlike joy, a joy within one's self.

Blessed are the poor in spirit ...

- those who feel a deep sense of spiritual poverty (see Isaiah 66:2)
- those who have detached themselves from possessions to follow Jesus
- those who put their entire trust in God and obey God completely

Blessed are those who mourn ...

- those who have compassionate hearts, whose hearts are 'broken' because of the world's suffering and one's own sin
- those who have endured deep sorrow

Blessed are the meek ...

Gentle is the closest English translation for the original

- those who are angry at moral injustice, but never angry for selfish reasons
- those who have the humility to see their own weakness and ignorance
- those who are totally God-controlled

Blessed are those who hunger and thirst for righteousness ...

(see Isaiah 55:1-2, John 4:14, John 6:51)

- those who fast and pray for the coming of the kingdom
- those who long for total goodness in the way a starving person longs for food

Blessed are the merciful ...

- those who forgive others
- those who 'get inside' others to feel their pain and to see with their eyes (as God did by becoming man)

Blessed are the pure in heart ...

Heart in Hebrew means the seat of thought and will. This includes chastity, but is not limited to that.

- those who have pure motives
- those who are sincere

Blessed are the peacemakers ...

- those who work actively to make peace, not by evading issues but by conquering them
- those who establish right relationships among others

Blessed are those who are persecuted for righteousness sake ...

Persecution was an ever-present fact of life in the early Church.

- those who are willing to be obedient to God and to serve as the conscience of the world, even at the cost of real consequences to themselves
- those who have given their lives to Christ

Though money didn't flow as freely as the rain that winter, my parents worked with joyful anticipation to give my brother and me a Christmas present we would never forget. They scrimped for months and then spent more than they could probably afford for a Marx electric train.

Then the day before Christmas, a cousin stationed at a nearby military base pulled into the driveway. Opening the trunk of his car he lifted out a large heavy box. My brother and I could hardly wait to see what it was. On Christmas morning we opened it first. Eagerly we unwrapped an expensive new electric train set. Wow! You had to pull us down off the ceiling. A Lionel train, too! Then we opened the presents from our parents – another electric train. Ho hum. And not nearly as extravagant as the one from our cousin. Guess whose we played with most?

Mom and Dad were hurt. The outlay for an unmarried Air Force lieutenant was nothing compared to the sacrifice my parents had made. But all we saw was the glamour of an expensive train. We counted our parents' gift as merely a nice accessory.

And in our days:.....

Our heavenly Father spends many a disappointing Christmas. Amidst the glittering ornaments and flashing Christmas lights, the hurry and hustle of shopping and wrapping and family get-togethers, parties and presents, trees and turkeys – who really cares about His gift? What gets more attention from us: our Father's gift of life in Jesus Christ or the quickly-wrapped department store gifts from our cousins?

Thank you, Father, for Jesus. Thank you for the abundant life that we, His disciples, can enjoy now. Thank you for sending us a most expensive gift—your own life. Thank you!

GOD'S ACCURACY

Book Review



TITLE: FAITH IN THE PUBLIC SQUARE

AUTHOR: ROWAN WILLIAMS

Former Archbishop of Canterbury Rowan Williams, in the final published work of his episcopacy, offers an interesting and compelling dialogue on many of the contemporary questions facing the Christian tradition in the twenty-first century. Williams weaves together a series of lectures in presenting a systematic treatment of topics such as the rise of secularization, Christianity's relationship to modern Islam, modern political institutions, as well as discussions surrounding social justice and the economy. Williams skillfully constructs an engaging narrative which challenges the reader to critically examine their Christian faith and witness through both historical and modern perspectives.

While Williams' narrative is at times fraught with obscure literary, political, and philosophical references, he presents his argument in such a way which assists the reader in following the many terms and definitions so essential for the overall argument of the book. Unlike many academic works, Williams' in *Faith in the Public Square* does not assume the reader has an intimate understanding of theological, philosophical, or political theory. He avoids simply using the heavily technical language of the field without first offering a definition, and giving helpful context for how he will use these terms and theories in presenting his argument.

One of the great paradoxes of our present age is that in our interconnected and globalized society we are becoming increasingly polarized and individualized. Williams in *Faith in the Public Square* asks us to think critically and differently about how we relate to each other in understanding how we all share a common foundation. This common foundation built on culture, philosophy, theology, and political institutions, Williams argues, is stronger than what divides us and we need to remain in dialogue and seek to understand one another once again.
